

ORGANIZER

keep on task create subtasks involve everyone

SKEPTIC

push possibilities ask questions reach understanding

RECORDER

check consensus record solutions keep notes

GROUP ROLES

CONCILIATOR resolve conflicts minimize stress promote safe space

EXPLAINER

emphasize main points check understanding of content; of roles

ENSURES THE GROUP AVOIDS PREMATURE AGREEMENT ASKS QUESTIONS THAT WILL LEAD TO UNDERSTANDING PUSHES THE GROUP TO EXPLORE ALL POSSIBILITIES

"I think that's a good point, but have you considered..."

"I am not so sure I agree with that. The way I see it..."

"I interpreted that differently."

"I can see how you came to that conclusion, but..."

"Here's another way to look at it."

"What exactly do you mean by...?"

Student Participation Guide: Roles & what to say

ORGANIZER

GETS THE GROUP ORGANIZED KEEPS THE GROUP ON TASK ORGANIZES TASKS INTO SUB-TASKS MAKES SURE EVERYONE HAS A CHANCE TO CONTRIBUTE

"[NAME], Do you mind...?"

"So who wants to ...?"

"I will..." / "I'll take..." / "I'll handle..."

"Okay, I guess we'd better get started."

"What do you think we should do first?"

"That's interesting. How about we go around the group and all explain something we understood."

"I wish we could keep chatting, but we better get some work done."
